## A Gender Perspective of Displacement and its Impacts on Livelihood:

**Presentation:** This study aims to examine the socio-economic conditions of displaced people at the Thilawa relocation site and analyze the positive and negative effects on women and men in terms of livelihood security, gender division of labour, and women's role in the household and community under the context of Special Economic Zone Development.

This study provides information on how social determinants of health affect gender differences and health disparities.
